Artist announced for waterfront public artwork

Locals and visitors will soon have another reason to explore the popular Jetty Baths Park picnicking spot, which continues to be enhanced as part of Transforming Bunbury's Waterfront.

An artist has been commissioned to enhance the area through the delivery of a unique public artwork that will pay tribute to the working harbour.

Andrew Frazer Designs has been awarded the contract to construct two sculptures that will book-end Jetty Baths Park and encourage people to venture to each end of the precinct.

With the nearby Bunbury Lighthouse as a source of inspiration, the sculptures will highlight how the striking landmark serves as a beacon that communicates through light and safely guides seafarers.

A simple yet dynamic approach to lighting will connect the two sculptures and provide a unique wayfinding nighttime experience for visitors, without impacting on local residents.

The installations will be constructed using the same corten steel material as the Wardandi Boodja sculpture

at the Koombana Foreshore, an area previously revitalised through Transforming Bunbury's Waterfront.

The awarding of the contract follows a tender process managed by the City of Bunbury. Funding for the project is from the South West Development Commission as part of Transforming Bunbury's Waterfront project.

Tenders have been called for the construction of a northern breakwater at Bunbury's Casuarina Boat Harbour – the key to unlocking a regional marine industry precinct.

The 460-metre-long breakwater will serve as the critical infrastructure needed to fulfill more of the city's potential as a thriving waterfront city by creating the sheltered waters needed for:

- A future marine servicing precinct incorporating boat lifting, boat servicing, and boat storage;
- Opportunities for serviced lease sites for other marine commercial activities, stimulating local business and job opportunities; and
- New commercial and recreational boat pens and service wharf, allowing vessels to safely moor year-round in Koombana Bay.

Another component is the refurbishment of the existing beach groyne on the Koombana Bay foreshore, which could be extended as part of a possible future Koombana Bay marina, subject to environmental approval.

The harbour manager and delivery agency, the Department of Transport, is working closely with the lead agency, the South West Development Commission, to deliver the new breakwater.

It is anticipated that dredging work will commence mid-this year with construction of the breakwater expected to begin later in 2024.



Construction of the northern breakwater will require about 89,000 tonnes of armour rock and 435,000 tonnes of core rock.

Dredging work to prepare the foundation for the new breakwater and ensure safe navigation for the entrance channel will be included in the construction contract, which will be the largest awarded in Stage 3 of the \$78.1 million Transforming Bunbury's Waterfront project.

The community is already benefiting from earlier upgrades to the harbour including improvements to Jetty Road causeway, the refurbishment of the Casuarina Boat Harbour boat ramp, upgrade of the trailer parking area and a new ablutions block.
